Request from Ruth Oh: I have an exciting music item that I would like to share with you for the next PAC meeting if possible:

On June 8th, I am planning to co-host a band event with the music teacher at Hutton Elementary for band students from both schools.

"Band Fun Day" will be a full-day workshop that will end with a concert. It will give our grade 6/7 band students the experience of playing in a larger concert band. We will be hiring extra clinicians (musicians that will help us coach students in smaller groups), and we would also like to include lunch (pizza + a dessert) that day for participating students. Deanna (the music teacher at Hutton) has asked if CLES could contribute \$50 for hiring two clinicians, and \$10 per student for lunch and music scores.

I have 24 registered students in the 6/7 class (\$240 for lunch/scores) + \$50 contribution for hiring clinicians = \$290 is the budget total. Please let me know if this is an event that could possibly be funded by the committee and if you have any questions I could answer about the event.

I would also like to thank the committee for the Reeds. Students have been very gentle with them, and because we have been covering more music theory (to increase their independency in reading notes) than I expected, I think the reeds will last for the next 4-5 years in CLES Band.

Move to fund Ruth oh and her band class \$290 for Band Fund Day. Seconded by Shawn Paolone. Passed unanimously.

11. OLD BUSINESS & UPDATES

Darren Nordman's Field Trip Funding Request: The PAC has voted, and we will pay \$175.00 towards each student that goes, to help cover the cost.

The PAC also thinks that it would be a great idea to suggest to the parents and students, to put on a bottle drive, to help lower the cost for those who need it.

However, the PAC thinks that the funds raised by a bottle drive for this purpose should be split only between the families who show up to participate. If they do not participate, then they cover the remaining cost, if they do participate then they reap the rewards of helping.

As well, the PAC would like the parents and students to be aware of PAC's involvement and support, as this was not communicated as much as the PAC would have appreciated, during the last Grade 6/7 field trip.

Mr. Nordman mentioned that there are parents who have volunteered to do some fundraising for this trip. Details to follow.

Strategic Plan Update

Early Learning and Child Care Update

StrongStart - SD 51 StrongStart programs continue to operate with consistent attendance, staffed by fully certified Early Childhood Educators (ECEs).

This spring, after almost two years of operating within SD 51, a review of all StrongStart programs will commence to evaluate effectiveness and efficiency of the programs to ensure the district is capitalizing on its strengths and working to improve its stretches.

^{*}Note – Attendance is recorded as a positive occurrence. Attendance at Christina Lake and Hutton was low due to not having a program administrator in place at the time.

Strengthening Early Years to Kindergarten (SEY2KT) - The purpose of this provincial initiative is to provide opportunities for school districts and communities to work together in support of young children and their families.

A fireside community chat with dinner provided was held in Grand Forks in February. Attendees from SD 51, Boundary Child Care Resource and Referral, and the private childcare sector attended. Rich discussion revolved around the creative tension of where we currently are, where we want to be as a community and school system in relation to early learning and child care, and how we can strengthen the transition from early years to kindergarten.

Creating Possibilities for Young Children (CP4YC) - This inquiry program is back in SD 51 for another year with a new name (it used to be Changing Results for Young Children). Eight participants including

those from the private childcare sector, StrongStartECEs and Kindergarten/Grade 1 teachers are part of the community of practice. The results from SD51 (and other school districts) are submitted to the Ministry of Education and Child Care and are also compiled to be shared with educators across the province.

Seamless Day Kindergarten - A licensing application has been submitted to Interior Health requesting a Childcare License for Seamless Day Kindergarten, which would create a seamless (smooth) day for Kindergarten students by offering before- and after-school care within kindergarten classrooms. Teachers and ECEs will collaboratively provide care and learning support throughout the day. As indicated on the Before and After School Child Care Survey (see next section for results), Perley Elementary has the largest demand for before- and after-school care and also has a Kindergarten room that meets specific criteria; therefore, the first application is for Perley Elementary.

Please note, having a space licensed does not mean the program immediately begins. Recruiting qualified Early Childhood Educators is a challenge, and this program must have an ECE in place.

Just B4 - This program supports children in school-based preschool program to "just be four years old". Typically, the pilot program is offered in StrongStart spaces in the afternoon after StrongStart programming in the morning. Paperwork and licensing application have not begun for Just B4 at this time.

New Spaces Application Fund - The ChildCareBC New Spaces Fund provides funding to create new licensed child care, helping families access affordable, quality, and inclusive child care as a core service they can depend on. This fund will support ground-up builds, renovations and/or the purchase of equipment for infant, toddler and school age spaces. At this time, SD 51 is still gathering evidence required for applications.

Dual Credit ECE Programs - To meet the growing need for qualified Early Childhood Educators, the district is investigating possible dual credit programs with Selkirk College and/or Okanagan College for students in grades 11 and 12. More information will be available soon

- The revenue generated must cover all costs
- No operating money can be used to subsidize any part of the program (wages, equipment, etc.).

- As grade levels rise, transition rates decrease
- Results for Indigenous students and students with designations are on-par or better, though
 Indigenous students with designations do not have proportional rates from grade 11 to 12
- In our 5-year completion data, we know that Indigenous students and students with designations are disproportionately less likely to graduate in five years compared to other students
- In our listening experiences/student forums, we have an opportunity to hear the voices of these students to discover what the stories behind that data are.

Briefing Note – Enrolment Projections

Every February, all school districts in BC are required to submit enrolment projections for the next 3 school years to the Ministry of Education and Child Care. Our starting basis for enrolment projections is the student data collected from the February 1701 process. Here are the student Headcount and FTE by school at September 30, 2022 and February 10, 2023:

To project kindergarten enrolment, information is collected from Interior Health on birth rates in both the East and West Boundary. Data is also gathered from each school on kindergarten registrations to date, as well as enrolment data from StrongStart and data from the BC Child Care Resource & Referral (BCCRR) regarding number of school aged children registered in childcare programs in the Boundary
